

They work in an office.

Bakers Bake bread. They work in a bakery.

Barbers Shave men's beards and cut men's hair. They work in a barbers.

Barmen/women Serve drinks. They work in a bar, pub or restaurant.

Butchers Prepare and sell meat. They work in a butchers.


Chambermaids Clean and tidy rooms. They work in a hotel.

Chefs Prepare and cook food. They work in a kitchen.

Dentists Look after people's teeth. They work in a dentists.









Reading question types



Reading question

types
Multiple Choice Questions (MCQs)

Purpose: Tests detailed understanding of specific parts of the text.

True/False/Not Given

Tests the ability to differentiate between explicitly stated, implied, or absent information.

3

Yes/No/Not Given

Similar to True/False/Not Given, but focuses on the writer's opinion.

Matching Headings to Paragraphs

Tests the ability to identify the main idea of a paragraph.

3

Matching Information

Tests skimming and scanning skills.




Tests understanding of detailed information.

Short Answer Questions

Tests detailed comprehension.

Diagram/Flowchart/Table
/Note Completion

Tests ability to extract and organize specific information.
